We were **founded in 1904** to provide safe housing for women who came to work at the World's Fair.

We are the largest provider of direct Head Start services in Missouri, concentrated in St. Louis City and County.

We are the only program in the state to receive a **National Program of Excellence accreditation** from the National Head Start Association.

We receive more Head Start funding than any other agency that provides direct service in St. Louis City and County, and we are the **second largest recipient of funding in a four-state region.**

We're partnering with St. Louis Innovation Districts to build new early education centers and to enhance curriculum with ag-tech and bioscience at all YWCA centers, **helping** to support the community and prepare the workforce of the future.

We are the largest provider of sexual and domestic violence services for women in the region.

We are the **only dual services agency** (serving victims of sexual and domestic violence) in the St. Louis region, offering a 24/7 Crisis Help Line and a Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) that works with area hospitals and police departments.

We are the **only YWCA** in the United States with a Sexual Assault Response Team (SART).

We are the largest provider of Rapid Rehousing for victims of sexual and domestic violence in St. Louis City and County. We hold the largest HUD contract from city of St. Louis.

We are a trailblazer in economic empowerment:

WESP, our Women's Economic Stability Partnership, is a consortium of partners and service providers that lends support and technical assistance needed to create economic stability for women and their families.

DELIVERING ON OUR YWCA MISSION TODAY

Our agency has supported women and children for nearly 120 years, in areas such as housing, childcare, job training, women's rights, racial justice, violence prevention and crisis support. We are proud of our history - and our track record of being ahead of our time.

Today, our services work together holistically to support and improve the lives of women and their families:

Women's Services

- Crisis support services for victims of sexual and domestic violence
- Rapid Rehousing and permanent supportive housing
- Sexual Assault Response Team (often the first call made by hospitals and first responders)

Early Education

- Accredited National Program of Excellence by National Head Start Association
- Early Head Start and Head Start grantee since 1991
- All teachers have at least a Bachelor's degree
- Enhanced STREAM (Science, Technology, Reading, Engineering, Art, Math) curriculum in all centers
- Employment opportunities for parents

Economic Empowerment

- Employment and training
- Entrepreneurship and business development opportunities
- Empowerment services (financial literacy, asset building)
- Promotes racial justice by closing the wealth gap
- Support services (food, childcare, transportation) available to sustain all YWCA clients while in our programs



Challenge

Lack of training for first responders and nurses on treatment for domestic violence and sexual assault often causes victims to opt out of reporting the crime and/or seeking treatment

Solution

SANE (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner) Training teams YWCA professional staff, first responders and nurses to administer victim-centered, trauma-informed care. This crucial approach increases the likelihood that a woman will complete treatment to support physical and emotional healing.

Challenge

Lack of high-quality childcare and early education, and shortage of early childhood teachers

Solution

We have partnered with Innovation Districts (39 North, Donald Danforth Plant Science Center, Cortex and others) to build new Early Education Excellence Centers to serve those communities and to provide enhanced STREAM curriculum at all YWCA Early Education Centers to help train the future workforce.

This new revenue model for YWCA will support other agency programs and will always include children from families with lower income who receive Head Start funding.

Further, we are training parents to assist teachers in the classroom, creating pathways for them to become teachers themselves. This two-generation (2Gen) approach builds family well-being by intentionally working with children and the adults in their lives together. We're adding to the workforce now and preparing the workforce of the future.

Challenge

Despite significant opportunity in our market, the length of time it takes to place women in small business is a barrier.

Solution

We are identifying opportunities to train and place women in entrepreneurship in an expedited timeframe - and we provide wraparound services to sustain her through the process: grocery assistance, childcare, transportation, business coaching and more. Her success becomes her community's success as her business creates jobs and adds to the tax base.

When Vicky arrived at the hospital, staff immediately called the YWCA Sexual Assault Response Team (SART). With our SART advocate's help, Vicky was connected to a YWCA therapist and subsequently was identified as a victim of human trafficking. YWCA immediately provided safe housing for her and began treatment.

Over the next year, she received intensive treatment for her trauma, assistance with outstanding medical bills through VOCA (Victims of Crime Act), and help purchasing a car so she would have reliable transportation to and from work. YWCA also connected her with resources where she obtained assistance finding an apartment, plus financial assistance for her deposit and three month's rent.

Today, Vicky lives in stable housing, has a good job and has returned to college. She believes YWCA changed her life. We agree. Our holistic approach to supporting victims of sexual assault indeed changes lives and leads to inspiring success stories like this one.

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
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
